



The particular participants on FB pages are not really important here, but their behavior is. And it seems the younger the instigator, the more morally superior and smarter they are than the rest of us.

So the relative faceless anonymity of Facebook, Twitter, etc. allows for the most annoying species of all, the haughty *Know-it-All*.

It was not always that way.

In days past where modern technology and bullying had not yet intruded, agreements, disagreements, assertions and denials were handled in person. I am taking a look back to a person and an era that has passed but is instructive.

My grandfather, Ralph Villers (1902-1981) was an amazing person in his own right. Growing up in Weirton, W.V., he had only an eighth grade education. That was as much education as most students received in 1916.

Yet, he was the most intelligent person I have ever known. Now how could that be?

He knew what he didn't know.

He would get you the answer.

He would do so with civility and without bravado, snark, contempt or outright hostility.

That is what is missing in today's world - respect for the individual no matter the differences in opinions and points of view, to disagree without being disagreeable.

Such as counting to ten before lighting the fuse. Giving a little thought to what you are about to say and send.

How about using a little discretion before you act? That would be very welcome to me - how about you the reader?

I don't wish to return to a world a century ago - only to more courteous and respectful norms.
